

NETBALL

The netball season reached its climax just before the Easter holiday with the Coventry Schools tournaments, with an amazing six KHVIII teams reaching finals.

The U13A, U14A and U16A teams all finished runners-up of their respective competitions, receiving silver medals, while gold medals were awarded to the U12Bs and city champions U12A and U15A VIIs.

The U12A team secured victories against Bishop Ullathorne 5-1, Bluecoat 4-1, President Kennedy 4-1 in the semi-final and Bablake 7-2 in the final.

The U15A's route to trophy took them past President Kennedy 24-0, Bishop Ullathorne 23-1, Coundon 18-2, Bablake 'B' 15-2, Finham 20-3 in the semi-final and Bablake 'A' 19-8 in the final. The team scored 119 goals and conceded only 16 throughout the whole tournament!

KING HENRY VIII RELAY RACE @ 50!

On Wednesday 2nd February, 82 teams attended the 50th King Henry VIII Relay Race in The War Memorial Park. Conditions on the day were perfect: dry but overcast skies meant no glare for runners, and generally dry weather in the lead up to the race, with just a little light rain, created good ground with no boggy mud to slow down the athletes in the off-road sections of the course.

The boys' race saw the fastest run since 1980, with eventual winners being The Judd School, in 70.44 (6x 2.3 miles). Bradford Grammar School defended their title as 2020 winners of the girls' race, with a new record race time of 52.32 (4x 2.3 miles), beating the previous holders by over two clear minutes!

As part of the 'Golden' 50-year celebrations for this year's event, there was also a one-off

Alumni race for former students, teachers and coaches. A varied field, with some familiar faces, made for a memorable race. In first place was Matthew Watson of Ermysted's School, in the 40-49 age group, who finished his lap in an astonishing 11.05. This would put him 14th equal in the boys' race records and was apparently an improvement on his times competing as a school-aged runner, a couple of decades earlier!

It was wonderful to see many long-time supporters of the event spectating. Prizes were distributed by special guest speaker David Moorcroft OBE, who has a long association with the KHVIII Relay. He was accompanied in presenting by Ges Cosgrove, a member of the original winning team (Bishop Ullathorne School, Coventry) back in 1972.

The entire KHVIII community was devastated to hear of the passing of Relay Race founder Ted Norrish just a few weeks after he had attended the 50th event as a guest of honour. In addition to his role as a Classics master, Ted revolutionised school athletics and cross country, as well as introducing orienteering. 












To celebrate 25 years of changing lives through a love of shared reading on World Book Day, the children and staff at KHPS dressed up as their favourite book characters!

Year 3 & 4 Play



VEX ROBOTICS National Awards









Our VEX robotics teams have had an amazing season, with a record 10 teams reaching the national finals at the International Centre in Telford at the end of the Easter holiday.

The VRC category, covering years 10-13 were first to compete, with all four King Henry's teams having qualified over the course of the season. 1408V (Vector) and 1408F (Floppy) made it all the way to the semi-finals, where they were narrowly defeated. The disappointment was

short lived, with teams picking up two judges awards; 1408S (Spicy) being presented with the 'Build Award' for their well-crafted robot; and 1408F (Floppy) receiving the 'Create Award' for their innovative engineering design.

The IQ competition for years 7-9 was up next. An impressive six King Henry's teams qualified for the event, a number matched by only one other school in the country! After two days of competition, five of our teams made it through

to the final round, with 1408C (Caution!) finishing highest in eighth position. Another three judges' awards came our way, with 1408D (Dumbo) collecting the 'Energy Award' for their extraordinary enthusiasm, 1408K (Dune) receiving the 'Sportsmanship Award' in recognition of their respect and interactions with teams and officials, and finally 1408C (Caution!), who also collected the 'Create Award' for innovative engineering design.









SWALLOWS

Sykes, J. O. Phipps MA Oxon, King Henry VIII School To the many dedicated staff and owner Headmasters. Inspired teachers to many Coventry children.

The Lord Mayor visited Swallows in January to unveil two blue plaques. The first celebrates Ernest Instone, who was the last private resident of 'The Firs' between 1907 & 1920. Instone was a pioneer of the early motor industry and one-time General Manager and Engineer with Daimler. The second plaque commemorates first three Headmasters of Coventry Preparatory School, founder Rev Kenelm Swallow MC (1920-52), John Sykes (1952-66) and John Phipps (1966-92).

MARTIN JACQUES LECTURE

On Saturday 9th April, former pupil of King Henry VIII, Martin Jacques returned to his old school for the first time since 1964 to present a lecture titled "Understanding China on the global political stage".

Martin is one of the most highly-respected political commentators of the late Twentieth and early Twenty-First Centuries. In 2009 he published *'When China Rules the World'*, which has been highly influential both in China and the West. It has been translated into sixteen languages and sold 400,000 copies. In the book Martin prophetically argued that China would become the leading country in the world and, far from becoming a Western-style society, would remain highly distinctive.

China continues to be his main interest, arguing that to make sense of China we need to understand it in its own terms rather than through a Western prism. His aim is to appeal to a broad range of political opinion and to encourage a wide audience to think about China in a different way.



On 26th March, in glorious sunshine, a group of Old Coventrians got together on the old 1st XV pitch on the school field for a rugby match in memory of two giants of KHVIII sport, Keith McGawley and Geoff Courtois. Mr McGawley was Director of Sport between 1958 and 1990, and was supported through much of that period by Mr

Before kick-off two benches, presented by the players, were positioned overlooking the field, each with a dedication plaque bearing words of advice and encouragement to ensure these legends of KHVIII sport continue to inspire pupils for many years to come.

Courtois as Head of Boys Sport 1964-1993.

The game was skilfully and sympathetically refereed by Mr Huxford, who had coached many of the players during his first years at King Henry's in the late 1980s, and was watched by a bumper crowd of over 100 friends of the School. With the warmth of a golden spring day, the lush green turf of the hallowed field and the joyful bond of forty-year-old friendships, the final score line of 6 tries to 4 was very much an afterthought to those in attendance. All agreed that Keith and Geoff would be looking down on their former charges with immense pride and affection, with the words inscribed on Geoff's bench eerily poignant, "It's a beauty".








TRANSPORT
